Rotary's Guiding Principles

These principles have been developed over the years to provide Rotarians with a strong, common purpose and direction. They serve as a foundation for our relationships with each other and the action we take in the world.

Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- **FIRST:** The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- **SECOND:** High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- **THIRD:** The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- **FOURTH:** The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The Four-Way Test

The Four-Way Test is a nonpartisan and nonsectarian ethical guide for Rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships. **Of the things we think, say or do:**

1. Is it the TRUTH?
2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

Avenues of Service

We channel our commitment to service at home and abroad through five Avenues of Service, which are the foundation of club activity.

- **Club Service** focuses on making clubs strong.
- **Vocational Service** calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society.
- **Community Service** encourages every Rotarian to find ways to improve the quality of life for people in their communities and to serve the public interest.
- **International Service** exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding.
- **Youth Service** recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs. In District 6950, we actively support, and we are IMPROVING our support of
 - **Interact** – for High-School and Middle-School students
 - **Rotaract** – for college/university students and young adults (age 18 to 30) in community-based clubs
 - **Rotary Youth Exchange** – for “outbound” high school students as well as “inbound” students from other countries
 - **Seminar for Tomorrow's Leaders (S4TL)** – in place of Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) for rising high school seniors

Interact Scholarship Essay

Service above Self is one of the greatest life lessons I have learned. I have been involved in Interact since junior year and I am currently the President of the club at the high school. What the phrase 'service about self' means is basically putting others before yourself to benefit a community, person, group, etc. It could be as small as giving the last piece of gum in the pack to a classmate or as big as standing on the front-line fighting for our country. There are many different ways people show this and it is a great quality to possess. I have been privileged to get to see this in real life and meet some people who are such role models when it comes to this quality. Today I am going to explain what service about self means to me, and share some of my experiences of seeing this first hand through Interact.

Service about self, I believe, is a quality that some were born with and others gain through growing up and meeting certain people. However, not everyone is blessed with this characteristic as you can see in the everyday world. If everyone did have this quality, the world would be a perfect place. It means to put others above yourself no matter what the situation is. It doesn't matter if you don't want to or don't feel like it, you still do it. To some this may seem contradictory of a leader because the leader should be the boss but I think the leader should be bettering his people before himself. Service above Self is a quality that more people need in high school, and the world, because you never know who needs that extra push.

I have been able to meet some great Rotarians who show this aspect of Service above Self first hand. Mr. Shook (Don Shook, RC of Crystal River – District Annual Funds Chair) is a great example of what Service above Self means. Every Wednesday he comes to Interact, no matter what, and he is always making sure that we have all the support we need and answers any questions we have. One of my personal favorite activities we do is the Christmas shopping. Every single person there shows ample amounts of this quality. We all want to help a child's family, we all give up a Saturday morning, and we all come together with the money we have to help a family have a great Christmas. I remember my first ever Ro-

tary event I attended, Stop Hunger Now. I was so in shock at how many people were there volunteering and how welcoming everyone was. I saw everyone coming together to serve a much greater cause. I can't count the amount of Saturdays I've woken up early to get out in the community and help people. However, I also can't count the memories I've made and people I have met through this which makes it all worth it. I also have seen how the foreign exchange students have been so welcomed and feel so happy to be here. I also have known them since the beginning of the school year and I have seen so much change in their personalities and how much

they have learned from being here. They show Service above Self in school and any time I am around them, they also have gotten a lot more outgoing and speak more at the weekly meetings by asking questions and making comments about things. It is crazy to see how much they have learned from their

host families, friends, and Rotary as a whole. Being President has given me an opportunity to portray Service above Self to everyone at my school and then show it to the Rotarians in the county.

In conclusion, Service above Self is an aspect of my life that I continue to work on and grow. Putting people above yourself is not always easy but it something that pays off in the long run. I have put this into action many times through Interact and continue to as I go to University of Florida and join Rotaract. I am beyond thankful that I have acquired this quality so early on and that I get to be surrounded by such role models that always show me what Service above Self means to them and the community. FOUNDATION GIVING

Giving and recognition data for your club and club members will be recorded in the contribution and recognition reports available to club officers in My Rotary. In celebration of our Foundation's centennial, several of these goals refer to the original donation of \$26.50 that started The Rotary Foundation in 1917. Additionally, \$536 is the approximate equivalent of \$26.50 today.

Clubs must achieve 3 of the following goals:

- Support our Foundation with a contribution of at least \$536.
- Support our Foundation with a contribution of at least \$26.50 from each member.
- Attain at least \$2,650 in total giving to PolioPlus in honor of The Rotary Foundation centennial.
- Attain a minimum Annual Fund contribution of \$100 per capita.
- Attain a five-year high in total club giving to the Foundation (combined giving by all members under any designation, with a minimum contribution of \$26.50 per member) in honor of the Foundation's centennial.
- Increase the total number of Benefactors and Bequest Society members in the club by at least one.

Rotary Club of Hudson helping Hudson Elementary School

The first public school in Pasco County to require students to wear uniforms is Hudson Elementary, a school that Rotary Club of Hudson is in contact with all year to help with feeding programs, gift cards for scholars, prizes for sportsmanship, school/business partnerships, and now the uniform program.

Rotary Club of Hudson is providing a grant of \$1,000 to help the school provide the required polo shirts and shorts or other clothing items needed for the students to be compliant with the dress code. They allow students to attend class without the uniform, but after a couple of days they will talk

to the student about the requirement and find out why he or she is non-compliant. Our club's members have contributed wholesale clothing and bags for the Blue Bag weekend food program. One member is a mentor and says it is very effective to be one on one with students.

With the testing requirements for a low rated school, this has been a difficult year. The asst. principal has reported that the uniform requirement, although another thing that has to be monitored in an already busy day, has been quite effective in helping students concentrate more on studies.
