

Gerry Cachia wins 2018 Mr. Seminole Award

Gerry Cachia was never planning on attending this year's Mr./Ms. Seminole awards banquet.

So, the Seminole Chamber of Commerce, which hosts the awards ceremony each year, had to trick him into attending the Feb. 24 event at the Parkview Room in Seminole City Park. First, chamber volunteers asked Cachia, president of William Clare Entertainment,

for a PA system that could accommodate two microphones.

But when Cachia revealed that he still didn't plan to attend, Dr. Stephen Nickse, the event's host, told him that he would be receiving an award for The Red Sled, an initiative he helped found through Seminole Lake Rotary Club to collect holiday gifts for area foster children.

"I had no clue anything else was happening," Cachia said. "That was how they got me there."

To his surprise, he won the main honor of the evening, taking home the Mr. Seminole title for 2018.

"I'm extremely, extremely humbled and I certainly won't take the honor lightly," he said. "I'm in a fraternity of some pretty amazing people. I've been in Seminole since 1977 and know most of those individuals who have been Mr. Seminole. They are amazing people. They've done so many things for the city."

Bill Miller, the 2017 Mr. Seminole who led the selection committee that chose Cachia, said "it was quite an honor" to present the award to him.

"We couldn't have picked a better person," Miller said. "He's a wonderful gentleman and very, very active in the community."

Miller said he's known Cachia for more than 30 years through a variety of community events.

"He's always there if we needed anything and is always willing to help. He never wants credit. He just wants to help."

Cachia has been involved with the Seminole community since graduating from the University of South Florida with a bachelor's degree in marketing and advertising in 1977. His first job out of college was at the Seminole Mall.

Jobs were scarce for young college graduates at the time. So, when he saw the job listing, he pounced on it.

"It was for promotions director. I had no idea what it was or what they did," Cachia said. "If it had anything to do with marketing, I applied for it."

He was thrust into "a learn-as-you-go situation," he said, and is thankful to "the million mentors in Seminole" who helped guide him. It wasn't long before he was promoted to handle promotions for both the Seminole Mall and the Gateway Mall.

He eventually left to manage larger regional malls, and also carved out a career in marketing entertainment. He landed back at Seminole Mall twice, since, though. The last time, he worked under Brad Sebring, part of the Johnson family, the mall's original owners.

They opened Showoff Theatre Cachia helped bring entertainment and events, such as Seminole Sings, to the mall.

"I wanted to make it a place where shopping was entertaining," he said. "That was kind of my theme."

He also played a role in the creation of a nighttime holiday parade held the day after Thanksgiving. Eventually, that "transitioned from a mall thing to a city thing," he said.

He's been involved with a number of community organizations over the years. He's a longtime member of the chamber, sitting on its board of directors for four years. In the past, he's received both the Merit Award and the Business of the Year Award.

When he first came to Seminole, he was a member of The Lion's Club. Three years ago, he joined the Seminole Lake Rotary Club.

"They're great people who do a bunch of things for the community and around the world," Cachia said. "I really like those people and everything they do."

Last year, The Red Sled initiative raised more than \$40,000 in toys and monetary donations for Eckerd Youth Alternatives, which works with children in the local foster care system. The signature event of this initiative, The Red Party, doubled in size last year to more than 300 attendees. Next year he hopes they can raise more than \$50,000 for the organization.

"It's grown to huge proportions," he said. "I always envisioned it to be the premiere holiday event in Seminole. I think eventually it will be that way. We're going to run out of places to hold it based on the size."

Though the initiative was born out of the annual holiday parties thrown by Cachia and his wife, Rene, he's quick to nod to the Rotarians when discussing The Red Sled's success.

"They jumped on this thing and called it their own," he said. "I'm just a small cog in that machine."

Several other awards were also presented at the Mr./Ms. Seminole banquet. Harold "Doc" Kinsey received the Merit Award. Arden Courts of Seminole was named Business of the Year. Culver's T.J. Schwebke was named Boss of the Year.

MILLER, Linda Gray (Rivers)



73, of Belleair Bluffs, FL completed her earthly journey peacefully at home 6 February 2018 with her husband and caregiver at her side.

She was born in Roanoke, Virginia in 1944 to Elizabeth Green Rivers (mother) and Dwight Gray Rivers (father), a WW-II veteran

and agronomist.

Gray attended Blacksburg High School (VA) for her senior year, later attending VA Tech for her BS in Human Nutrition & Foods. She subsequently performed graduate studies at Cornel University (NY) then returned to VA Tech for her MS in Human Nutrition & Foods. Her Master's Thesis was in diabetes research.

In 1969 she married Willard H. (Will) Miller, Jr. in the VA Tech Chapel, and a month later watched him depart for year in the Vietnam War as a newly commissioned Ensign on a US Navy destroyer. Their first child, David, was born upon Will's return. Just a few months later, Gray was again on her own as her husband began his second 12-month Vietnam deployment, ashore.

After Will finally returned from Vietnam, the couple moved to Will's hometown of Hampton, Virginia where they raised David, and later his new sister, Beth. After mothering the children to school-age, Gray entered the workforce in 1978 as the Cafeteria Manger at Christopher Newport University in Newport News, VA. In this position, she once had the honor of making lunch for guest speaker & actress Elizabeth Taylor, who was then married to VA Senator John Warner. (Liz was on a diet that day and didn't eat much!)

In 1981 Gray became the Assistant Supervisor, School Food Service for Newport News, VA Public Schools where she oversaw a \$4M budget.

Returning to her home-turf in Hampton, Gray became Assistant Director, School Food Services in 1984 for Hampton City Schools where she was the Purchasing Agent for 33 public schools, serving 12,500 lunches and 2,000 breakfasts daily.

In 1989, she received an A.A.S. in Hotel, Restaurant, and Institute Mgt. from Thomas Nelson Community College in Newport News, VA.

Gray was the Past President of the Virginia School Food Service Association representing school food service professionals throughout the state of Virginia.

Gray accepted a position in 1990 with the Virginia Depart-

ment of Education in Richmond, VA as a Specialist, School Nutrition Programs where she managed Severe Need Breakfast Programs, oversaw Grants, reviews, and financial reporting data. She provided guidance on USDA regulations to school districts throughout the state of Virginia, and trained state and local division staff. Gray drove 400 miles (round-trip) daily from her home in Hampton to her work in the state capitol city of Richmond, Virginia, generally a 12 to 14-hour day.

1n 1995 Gray took a job in Largo, Florida as Assistant Director, School Food Service and later as Director where she supported 140 Pinellas County public schools' Federal School Lunch Programs. She became a Master Trainer for the District for Culinary Techniques for Healthy School Meals and received many national awards for innovation & improving the quality of school lunch throughout the county. She managed a large professional staff and a \$30M budget.

Gray retired from serving Pinellas County Schools in March 2011 after 11 years of service. In retirement she enjoyed voluminous reading, supporting her granddaughter, Kayla, with her dance competitions, and periodic visits to her three other grandchildren, Michael, Marie, and Marc (a new Marine like his dad, David). She also delighted in visiting her dear friends, Ray & Dee Ford in nearby New Port Richie, FL.

In retirement, Gray also supported Will's rise up the ranks in Rotary International's local District 6950 to his final position as a District Governor. She accompanied him on almost all of his visits to 47 Clubs in the 4-county Rotary District, where she was welcomed and loved. She was an Honorary Rotarian in the Rotary Club of Largo, Florida, and helped them in their annual signature fundraiser: "Death by Chocolate."

Gray never focused on her own significant accomplishments, but was truly and completely a selfless soul, and focused on love for her family throughout her life. She absolutely embodied the Rotary International motto of "Service Above Self".

She will be missed by family, friends & associates in many states, and members of her "Rotary Family."

She is survived by her husband of 49 years (Will – Belleair Bluffs, FL), a younger brother (Mark – Zellwood, FL), a son (David Miller - Nottingham, PA), a daughter (Beth Feeney – Odessa, FL), and four grandchildren.
