

ANNOUNCING TWO NEW DISTRICT BENEFACTOR AWARDS The Jack Bakeman Award and the Richard Breske Award

Rotary District 6950 is pleased to announce two new awards which will be presented each year at our District Conference. Both awards are named after Past District Governors who served our district with passion and honor and were Major Donors and Bequest Society members of The Rotary Foundation.

Jack Bakeman was District Governor in District 6440 in 1987-88. This district is known as the "Home District" because it includes Evanston, IL, the site of Rotary International's headquarters. Jack was known throughout District 6440 as the Polio Governor, partly because he was a polio survivor, but more so because his district raised an incredible amount of money for Polio Plus when he was governor. After retiring, Jack moved to Dunedin and became a member of the Rotary Club of Dunedin. He continued to be very active in his club and in our district. He attended virtually every District Conference and District Foundation meeting we held. Unfortunately, Jack passed away two years ago. He is still sorely missed.

The award in Jack's name will be presented annually to the club in the district with the highest percentage of new Benefactors.

Richard Breske served our District as District Governor in 1998-99, under the theme, "Make Dreams Real." Since then he has dedicated much of his Rotary energy to doing just that. As a mem-

ber of The Rotary Club of Pinellas Park, he has championed the club's support of making dreams real for local residents through vocational training and scholarships. Leading by example, Richard has helped his club attain a remarkable record of over \$200 per capita in Annual Giving for eight (8) straight years! As our District 6950 Matching Grant's Committee Chair, Richard is easily our district's most knowledgeable and experienced Rotarian when it comes to Foundation Grants. Because of his leadership and dedication to humanitarian matching grants, he has had a major impact on the ability of each Rotarian in our district to "Make Dreams Real" for people around the world. As an electrical contractor, by vocation Richard brings light and power to buildings. As a Rotarian, by avocation Richard brings light and power to the concept of "Making Dreams Real" while "Building Communities and Bridging Continents."

The Richard Breske Award will be presented each year to the club that has the highest percentage of total Benefactors on April 30th.

No club may receive both awards in the same year.

Trinity Rotary Challenges the District

Sandy Barley, President of Trinity Rotary, along with nine other Rotarians spent a week in the Trojes region of Honduras installing water filters and latrines. The Rotary Clubs of Trinity and Danli in Honduras are partners in a clean water and sanitation project in the mountain areas around Trojes. That project is almost complete and the group spent a few hours visiting the village of Quebrada Larga. This is a community of 300 families, but only 200 of the families have water filters that were installed by Pure Water for the World in 2006. The families without filters are either new households or households whose filters were destroyed in a flood. The only children still getting sick are those without filters. We want to raise money for filters and latrines in Quebrada Larga and four

other Districts around the US are working with Trinity Rotary on this.

Sandy has issued a challenge that Trinity Rotary will match all contributions from any Rotary club in District 6950 and his club has set aside \$5000 for the match.. If you still have funds in your international budget and would like to participate in a water project which saves the lives of children, or if you need an International project to round off your Presidential Citation Application this could be right for you. Any amount is gladly accepted and appreciated. AND DOUBLED WITH THE MATCH!

ROGER PROFFER, SR as our District Governor Nominee Designate (DG for Rotary Year 2013- 2014)

Roger Proffer was born in Rankin, Michigan in October of 1941 and raised up on a small farm. In 1960 he joined the Air Force and was schooled in electronics and worked as an aircraft radio and served as a radar technician. His service time included 3 years overseas in the Far-East including a time in Vietnam.

After his military service Roger returned to Michigan and spent several years working as an Electronics technician. During this time, Roger met Linda when she kept serving him special helpings when he ate at the diner her mother owned. Soon after they married, Roger received a very poor health diagnosis so he decided to leave his electronics job and changed his life to serve as a Baptist missionary to Mexico and was ordained into the Ministry in 1981. His health returned better than ever!

When Roger and Linda returned to the United States they moved to Brandon and purchased a military outlet

store and they eventually move their life and business to Crystal River, Florida in 1987. The business became the Military Outlet, Inc. which Linda and Roger still operate. Since moving to Crystal River, Roger became very active in community service by serving on the Crystal River City Council 2002 - 2006 and has served on political action boards including Heart of Florida, and the Suncoast League of Cities. Roger is also an Amateur Radio operator with the call name "KG4MOI".

Roger was invited to the Rotary Club of Crystal River Kings Bay in April of 2002 and served as their Club President in 2005-06. He has served the district in a number of committees most notably on Foundation committees and is currently the Annual Giving Chair. Roger was also one of the driving forces in bringing the 6 Rotary clubs in Citrus County together and working as a team towards a common goal of service. He is married to Linda Proffer, also a Rotarian, and a charter member and co-founder of the Rotary Club of Sugarmill Woods. Linda

serves the club as Treasurer and is on the district committee of the Fund Council.

He is most proud of the water projects he has spearheading in the Honduras for the last 20 years, installing over 500 potable water wells and over 15 water systems serving many homes. In another project, Roger met with Mexican officials, discovered a need and upon return to Florida, a fire truck was purchased, refurbished and then driven and delivered to a city in Mexico that had no fire service.

Roger will be the first District Governor selected from Citrus County since the 1993-94 Rotary year when Earl Samstag served as Governor.

Roger and Linda are both multiple Paul Harris Fellows and they have six children and 16 grandchildren of which they are very proud.



Who is Packing Your Parachute?

Charles Plumb was a US Navy jet pilot in Vietnam. After 75 combat missions, his plane was destroyed by a surface to air missile. He ejected and parachuted into enemy hands, spending the next 6 years in a communist Vietnamese prison. He now lectures on the lessons learned from that experience.

One day Plumb was sitting in a restaurant and another man came up to him and said "You're Plumb! You flew jet fighters from the Kittyhawk and you were shot down!"

"How in the world did you know that?" asked Plumb.

"I packed your chute" the man replied. The men shook hands and Plumb thanked the man for the chute that had worked and saved his life.

Plumb couldn't sleep that night, thinking about that man. Plumb wondered what he had looked like in a navy uniform. He wondered how many times he might have seen the man but not even said "Good morning, how are you?" or anything else because the man was just a sailor and Plumb was a fighter pilot. Plumb thought about the many hours

the sailor had spent in the bowels of the ship, standing at a long wooden table, carefully weaving and folding the silks of each chute, holding in his hands the fate of someone he didn't know.

Now Plumb asks his audience, "Who is packing your parachute?"

Everyone has someone who provides what they need to make it through the day.

He also points out that he needed many kinds of parachutes when his plane was shot down over enemy territory - he needed his physical chute, his mental chute, his emotional chute, and his spiritual chute. He called on all of these supports before reaching safety.

Sometimes in the daily challenges that life gives us, we miss what is really important. We fail to say hello, please or thank you, congratulate someone on something wonderful that has happened to them, give a compliment or just do something nice for no reason. As you go through this week, this month, this year, recognize people who pack your parachutes

Little shoppers prepare for merry Christmas



The store was bustling with activity early Saturday morning. Customers were lined up outside in the bitter cold with shopping lists in hand before the doors even opened. It looked like a typical busy Christmastime shopping day, except for one thing.

All of the shoppers were children.

A closer look revealed none of those children were with their parents. Rather than shopping with their families, they were shopping for them. Jewelry for moms, sweaters for dads, toys for sisters and brothers and presents for aunts, uncles and grandparents.

Each year, Rotary Clubs in Citrus County treat underprivileged students to a day of shopping at the Crystal River Kmart, which opened early on Saturday so that Rotary members and kids could shop. Santa and Mrs. Claus ushered the elementary school-aged children into the store.

The young shoppers had plenty of help from Rotary Club members and members of Rotaries high school and college organizations.

This year, more than 100 children received \$100 gift cards that enabled them to select just the right gifts for their loved ones and a little something for themselves.

Many of them said this was their first time buying Christmas presents for family members.

"I got presents for everyone," said 8-year-old Jacob, who sought the advice of his helpers, Interact members Elizabeth Lynch and Rachel Albrecht, both 16-year-old Citrus High School students, for each purchase.

For 8-year-old Stacey, smart shopping meant modifying her original gift list, which at first included a DVD player that would have caused her to go over budget.

"We are improvising. She's coming up with a whole new list," said Rotary member Linda Daly. "She has a lot of great ideas."

Daly has been participating in the Rotary Christmas shopping program for 10 years. The program itself started with Rotary Club of Crystal River more than 25 years ago.

Deborah Richmond, a Floral City resident who is helping her friend raise one of Saturday's young shoppers, said people tend to think of disadvantaged families living in other countries, but sometimes fail to recognize that there are local children who need help.

"People who aren't going through it don't realize that it's their neighbor, not someone in another country or another city, but right here," she said.

"I just think right now, there are so many children in need. I think it's very touching that they (Rotary members) are doing that. These are very special people."

Rotary Club of Crystal River member Keith Taylor said the goal of the program is simply to help the children have a happier Christmas.

"The purpose is to help those less fortunate at this time of year, so they can have a more enjoyable holiday," he said. "They can enjoy it individually, for themselves, and with their families."
