Running the District ...

Over the past month nearly everyone has asked me one or more of the following: "are you excited?"; "are you ready?"; "what do you plan to do as District Governor?" Yes, I am definitely excited and I am as ready as I'm going to be!

This is the first of my monthly columns as District Governor. I want to focus on my answer to the "what do you want to do" question. Because Rotary has so many different programs that provide so much benefit, this is potentially the greatest challenge for the Governor.

In 2009 I led the effort by District 6950 to create a new strategic plan. The plan was adopted by district leadership in November, 2009. PDG Cliff Snedeker, PDG Lynda Vinson, and I agreed that we would work together to help achieve what was set forth in the plan. As a continuation of that pledge, my goal will be to focus on following the District Strategic Plan. Without delving into the details of that plan, I believe it means we should focus on the basics of Rotary. So let's talk about those "basics".

To me the most fundamental thing to consider about Rotary is what makes it unique. What makes Rotary truly distinctive is based upon the revolutionary insight of Paul Harris and the other early Rotarians:

- Take a group of successful people

from a broad range of businesses and professions, each with his own network of contacts, each with high ethical standards

- Combine them into a new, larger network
- Encourage them to hold each other accountable
- Meet their needs for fellowship, networking, mentoring, leadership development, and service
- Then utilize that new network to address problems of the local community and the world.

There is no other organization quite like Rotary: one organization creates a network to meet the needs of its members, then utilizes that same network to meet the needs of the local community and the world. The insight is captured best in The Object of Rotary. It truly is "our secret sauce".

When people ask me, what is Rotary, I have two different answers. The long answer is "The Object of Rotary". The short answer is, "A global network of leaders transforming lives both near and far".

Emphasizing the "basics" this year means encouraging clubs to revisit The Object of Rotary and serving the needs of the members (so they can then do a better job of meeting the needs of the community and the world). From there, it means encouraging our clubs to do more of the great things they've already been doing. I've developed a list of Five Key Questions for each club to consider. I'll provide more on that when I visit each club and in future newsletters.

In terms of specific goals, I have the following:

1. Have every club earn a Presidential Citation
2. Increase membership by 60 people (an average of one person in each club)
3. Charter one new club in the district
4. Improve member retention in our

clubs

5. Raise a record amount of money for the Rotary Foundation
6. Increase the involvement of our district in Rotary's Camp Florida.

As you look at each goal, add the following preface to each: "Have lots of fun while we ..." If we're not having lots of fun as we do the work of Rotary, we're doing something wrong.

Thank you, again, for the opportunity to serve you as leader of District 6950 this year. Have lots of fun as you keep doing great things in your club! I look forward to visiting your club.

The Object of Rotary

First formulated in 1910 and adapted through the years as Rotary's mission expanded, the Object of Rotary provides a succinct definition of the organization's purpose as well as the club member's responsibilities.

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

District Water Committee Needs Volunteers

The District 6950 water committee is looking for Rotarians who recognize the critical role that clean water has now, not just in the future. According to the World Health Organization, clean, safe drinking water is not available to over 1.2 billion people. More than twice that number do not have access to adequate sanitation. And almost 4,000 children, most under the age of 5, die every day due to diarrheal disease caused by drinking contaminated water.

The Rotary Foundation, in their "Future Vision Plan," has designated water and sanitation as one of the 6 key areas of focus. R.I. also launched a Water and Sanitation Rotary Action Group (WAS-RAG) in March 2007 to address this important global issue. Besides providing information to Rotary clubs and districts, it urges every Rotarian to become aware of water-related issues and participate in a water or sanitation project. The group also works to identify, facilitate, and develop guidelines for major Rotary water

and sanitation efforts around the world.

The main goal of the District 6950 water committee will be to raise awareness, possibly through a district-wide water and sanitation project. There are two Rotarians in the district who have been very involved with water projects. Roger Proffer, working through New Testament Missions in Sebring FL., is currently installing water systems in several villages in the eastern end of Honduras. Pure Water for the World, represented by Barry Poppel, has a program in the south of Honduras near the Nicaraguan border which includes water filters, sanitation and hygiene education. Both organizations have trips available to visit their projects. Roger and Barry are also available to speak to your clubs about their water projects.

Schwettman Education Center

Kids are kids and if given the opportunity they all really want to do the right thing.

The name Interact was created by combining the words "international" and "action." Interact clubs are sponsored by Rotary clubs as a program of Rotary International. Rotary clubs provide guidance and inspiration, but the Interact clubs are self-governing and self-supporting.

When you think of an Interact club you generally don't think of a school where the student body is made up of kids who have violated the School Board policy, had behavior problems, been recommended for expulsion or just disrupted the learning environment of the school but that is exactly the kids that make up the newest Interact Club in the World: the Schwettman Education Center's Interact Club, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Trinity.

Schwettman Education Center is a voluntary educational program the district provides for students who have

had issues fitting into the mainstream school system of Pasco County, Florida. Many of these students are facing expulsion or have a behavior pattern which has not improved with the intervention strategies used. Schwettman provides an alternative to expulsion with a positive, intensive behavior change program staffed with a full-time Student Services Support team that targets teaching coping and survival skills and assist students in developing a positive attitude towards learning, the school environment, school staff, and their peers.

The Rotary Club of Trinity has long been a supporter of the Schwettman Education Center by providing funds for their annual Thanksgiving Family Dinner when the students can invite their families for a home cooked meal and the Shark Bite Program where the students are rewarded for good behavior with prizes such as dinner or a movie for the family.

Barley came to the board of directors and said "I have a crazy idea I want to run past you..." With that the idea of an Interact Club at Schwettman was born. When asked how he came up with the idea he said "I was thinking that we give some money each year but that really isn't enough. These are kids in our own community who need a helping hand and some positive role models. A lot of these kids have never had anyone they

could depend on. Forming an Interact club gives them all a goal, a chance to do things with no thought of rewards,

a chance to build friendships along the way with leadership skills. Plus as Rotarians we are committed to their success; not just involved. Remember that old saying about a bacon and egg breakfast; the chicken is involved but the pig is committed!"

President Sandy explained to the kids that "even though it can often feel like no one cares about you; now you can know that you have 74 folks (members of the Trinity Rotary) who even though they don't really know you, all really do care a whole lot about you. This is one of the most important parts about the entire interact program".

On Friday, April 8, 2011 President Sandy presented the new Interact club with their charter from Rotary International. Representing Rotary District 6950 was Governor Lynda Vinson and District Chairman Mitch Hernandez. New Port Richey Mayor Scott McPherson was also on-hand to welcome the Schwettman Interact Club, and presented a framed Proclamation on behalf of the City congratulating both Schwettman, and Trinity

Rotary, for this new partnership.

The Interact Club of Schwettman's faculty adviser is Mark Babiarz, a former member of the Rotary Club of Trinity. When asked what his thoughts are on the new Interact Club Mr. Babiarz said "Schwettman Education Center is a school for academically and behaviorally challenged students. Students at Schwettman Education Center realize that joining the Interact Club is an opportunity they may not receive at a regular school. The Interact Club gives our students the opportunity to develop leadership skills that they can take back to their home school or better prepares them for the challenges that college will give them as they move on past high school graduation.

The Interact Club has unified students across all grade levels that may have otherwise remained segregated

as Middle School and High School students while bringing them closer to a sense of community. The Interact Club serves as a voice for the students that the principal can count on to communicate with students and bring about positive change for increasing academic achievement."

Schwettman Interact Club's first fundraiser was a recent car wash where they raised \$100, half of which went to support Pure Water for the World; a non-profit (501c3) that works to prevent children from suffering from water-borne diseases that cause pain as a result of improper hygiene habits and consuming contaminated water. This is done by providing a sustainable package of services- water filtration systems, latrines and hygiene education to families and communities in developing countries. The Rotary Club of Trinity also supports Pure Water for the World and has actually sent several of its own members to install those systems in Honduras.

"We are very proud of our inaugural Interact Club members and taking on the leadership roles necessary to start this tremendous opportunity the Rotary Club of Trinity has presented to our education community. Our challenges will be finding new students to continue the good deeds and services our first year club has completed. The Schwettman Education Center Interact Club conducted a car wash to help with the Rotary Club of Trinity in their International projects and join with them in local community projects. We look forward to building on the success of the first year and look for better things to come in the future." stated Mr. Randy Koenigsfeld, Principal of Schwettman Educational Center.

Charlotte and Don Higgins, from the Pinellas Park Rotary Club, arrived Saturday morning and helped staff the first Rotarians On Social Networks Fellowship (ROSNF) Booth #1190 in the House of Friendship. During the 5 days we were there, we had close to a 1,000 visitors to the booth where we handed out information cards and sold "ROSNF Like" buttons.

Don will be the chairman of the ROSNF Fellowship starting July 1, 2011. The fellowship helps Rotarians and Rotaractors around the world learn to use social networks like Facebook, LinkedIn, and Twitter. There are now over 750 ROSNF members from over 70 countries.

One of the highlights of the conven-

tion was the presentation by Bill Gates who has donated over \$350 million dollars toward the eradication of polio. Rotary International started the project in 1985 and has now spent over one billion dollars. As of today, there are only four countries with endemic polio: Nigeria, Afghanistan, Pakistan, and India. There were only a few hundred cases in the last year, and India only has had 1 case this year. We have come so far and we are so close! Bill urged all Rotarians to keep the pressure on to finish the fight, and rid planet earth of this dreaded childhood disease.

We enjoyed the entire conference, which was well planned and organized. The people of New Orleans from the Mayor to the Cashier at Subway welcomed us graciously and thanked Rotary for selecting their city. We enjoyed the plenary sessions, music, workshops, and meeting so many great Rotarians. We also squeezed in a little sightseeing and a beignet!

BELLEAIR LEARNS ABOUT THE TREATMENT OF PARKINSON'S DISEASE



Doctors Mike Andriola and Dean Gobo spoke to the club about Parkinson's disease. The disease is named after the physician who first identified its symptoms. Medical science has not determined the precise cause of Parkinson's but it has been found to affect the Basil Ganglia. It has been observed that as the ganglia deteriorate, they fail to produce a sufficient amount of Dop-

amine. Tremors and cognitive impairment are a common result; with one in three patients experiencing an impairment to their cognitive processes. It is a progressive disease and will only worsen over time, usually ending in a premature death.

Science has failed to discover a biological marker or a blood test that can pre-determine and predict whether a person has the disease. Treatment has included medications that showed promise in reducing tremors when first utilized in the 1930's and 1940's. In the 1970's L-dopa was found to provide a more effective relief of these symptoms.

Other treatments have included surgery wherein a specific portion of the brain was damaged in a controlled manner. This created lesions which acted to reduce tremors. This form of surgery has fallen out of favor and has been largely replaced by electronic stimulation. Elec-

tronic stimulation involves the placement of a battery in the chest, similar to that of a pacemaker. Electric current is then sent to electrodes placed in the brain. This method has the advantage of being both modifiable and reversible.

The combination of modern medications and electronic stimulation have resulted in the extension of the life span of patients by an additional twenty years or more. Doctors Andriola and Gobo predict that the future will see a focus on the treatment of the physical "freezing" of movement experienced by some patients.
