March is the month that Rotary celebrates Literacy, particularly the many programs carried out by local clubs and the Rotary Foundation to promote basic education and literacy. Without a doubt, increasing basic education and literacy in our local communities benefits everyone. Countless social and economic problems we face today are traceable to shortfalls, even outright failures, in this area.

Many of our Rotary clubs in District 6950 have undertaken programs to support basic education and literacy, including:

- Programs to provide dictionaries to children, especially third graders
- Mentoring programs in local schools
- Recognition of outstanding students, as well as students who have made substantial progress.

Beyond this, many individual Ro-

tarians are providing a range of support and services to local schools in the four counties that comprise District 6950. All of these programs help to strengthen local schools. A literate, educated citizenry is essential for the health of every local community. Our local clubs are supporting basic education and literacy in so many ways.

In support of local club efforts, District 6950 has established a District Literacy Committee, chaired by Pat Bauer of the RC of Dunedin. The task of this committee is to provide support to local clubs in efforts to promote basic education and literacy. As your club begins planning for the upcoming 2012-13 Rotary year, I encourage you to share what your club has been doing in this area, as well as learn about what other clubs have been doing. A great way to do this is to ask your club president to share what your club has been doing in basic education and literacy with the other clubs in your area. Club presidents meet monthly. This is also a great way to learn best practices from other clubs.

The Rotary Foundation has six areas of focus, one of which is basic education and literacy. It promotes education and literacy by:

- Ensuring that children have access to quality basic education
- 2. Reducing gender disparity in education
- 3. Increasing adult literacy
- 4. Strengthening the capacity of communities to support basic education and

literacy

5. Supporting studies related to basic education and literacy.

The other five areas of focus for the Rotary Foundation are:

- Peace and conflict resolution
- 2. Disease prevention and treatment
- 3. Water and sanitation
- 4. Maternal and child health
- 5. Economic and community development.

In the future, the Foundation will concentrate its efforts only in these six areas. Our top priority, polio eradication, relates to at least two of these six areas, and one can argue that it covers even more.

Speaking of the Rotary Foundation, I want to encourage you, your family members, and fellow club members to attend the District Rotary Foundation Dinner on March 22. The event will be held at Heritage Springs Country Club in Trinity. There will be a cocktail hour beginning at 6 pm, followed by a dinner at 7 pm. Our featured speaker will be PDG Brent William's from Gainesville. In addition to a fine meal and program, we'll be taking time to recognize the effort of individual Rotarians and clubs from around our district on behalf of the Rotary Foundation. SANDLER TRAINING

On the morning of February 8 when people began arriving at Ruth Eckerd Hall in Clearwater, it was clear that the District 6950 fund-raising partnership project with Sandler Training was a success.

The event, which attracted about 90 Rotarians and friends from throughout the District. The venture with Sandler was well worth doing for a lot of reasons: 1) it provided ample networking opportunities in the plenary, meal and break out sessions;

2) sales skills were identified, honed and revitalized through an exciting session by Jim Marshall, of Sandler, and taken over by his partner Clint Babcock; 3) an animated management discussion, moderated by Marshall, gave about 30 attendees in a breakout session the chance to share problems, techniques, victories and horror stories with peers and; 4) more than \$18,000 was sent

to The Rotary Foundation to benefit Polio Plus. Not a bad day's work.

The week after the event, Marshall, DG Carl Treleaven and Monte Trammer, program coordinator, met to review strengths and weaknesses of the project. Planning, which began last July, started early enough but the core group was too small. Any future effort, it was agreed, would benefit from a district-wide team of Rotarians famil-

iar with Sandler's programs and able to stress the benefit of the training above and beyond the financial benefit going to The Rotary Foundation.

It also was clear that an opportunity was missed to encourage clubs to provide scholarships to the event for staff members and executives of not-for-profit program they already

Schwettman Interact Club donates to Pure Water for the World

The Schwettman Interact Club donated \$100 to Pure Water for the World (PWW) to help kids and families in Honduras. Trinity Rotary matched it and it will be added to a NY/Honduras matching grant to total about \$500 which is enough to provide water filters, latrines, education and training to a family in Honduras.

Schwettman Education Center is a voluntary educational program the district provides for students who have violated School Board policy, have seriously disrupted the learning environment of the school, and have been recommended for expulsion from a school. Schwettman provide a positive, intensive behavior change program staffed with a full-time Student Services Support team that targets teaching coping and survival skills and assists students in developing a positive attitude toward learning, the school environment, school staff, and their peers.

The four current members of this club have done a great job so far this year. These young people are overcoming great obstacles and they have worked very hard to raise money for PWW. Recognition for something like this has the potential to change the lives of these kids forever.
