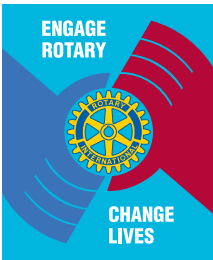

District Governor Roger Proffer visits Rotary Club of Sugarmill Woods

District Governor Roger Proffer with founding president Shelby Weingarten of the Sugarmill Woods Rotary greets members prior to his presentation to the Sugarmill Woods Rotary club on why he joined Rotary and what he continues to get from it. As he spoke, it was obvious that he is passionate about what Rotarians can do for others in need. He shared some of his personal experiences. Governor Roger Proffer and wife Linda had done missionary work in Mexico. He asked the leaders of one of the villages of their needs. From that conversation, he returned home and began to search for a much needed fire truck, getting it into tip-top condition, and then accompanied by members of the Kings Bay Rotary driving it to the poor village in Mexico. He shared his experiences of volunteering to meet the clean water needs of villages in Honduras.

Then he asked the SMW Rotarians "What is important about Rotary?" "Why did you join Rotary?" "What keeps you in Rotary?" Answers ranged from "fellowship" to "Service to others" to "fun." All of the responses were correct! But it is simplified with President Roger's response—"People!"

Roger shared information about the young people he and wife Linda had hosted in their home. He spoke of the pleasure they shared in learning about young people from other countries. And then, he spoke of an event from his recent trip to Portugal this past year. He and Linda called one of the young women living in Italy they had hosted in previous years who upon receiving the call said, "Come and stay with us for the next week." He and Linda did and saw Italy



through the eyes of a native. This is Rotary- person to person.

What is it about Rotary that brings us in? What keeps us in Rotary? Why are so many of us passionate about Rotary? Shelby Weingarten agrees with Roger, it is the people!

As founding president of the Rotary Club of Sugarmill Woods, Weingarten tells us that November, 2013 marks the fifth anniversary of the club that was sponsored by Kings Bay Rotary. She served as president of Kings Bay Rotary from 2007-2008. Prior to

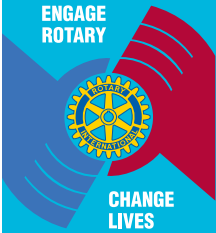

In April 2013, Rotarian Chuck Oldanie of the Seminole Lake Club, approached David Klement, the Executive Director of the Institute for Strategic Policy Solutions at SPC, to hold a



public forum discussing how we can facilitate the goal of World Peace. Chuck has been intimately involved with the Seeds of Peace, a world organization dedicated to foster better human relations through young, potential leaders from conflicted countries, by having them work and communicate together in conferences designed to allow them to understand each other in neutral settings. Rotary International has always held the idea that fostering understand-



ing amongst people is the best way to create tolerance and peace. Together, these two organizations have started to collaborate to magnify the impact of Peace through better understanding. With the sponsorship of Seeds of Peace and Tri-Sense Medical, LLC, the forum became a reality.

The World Peace Forum was held in the Digitorium of the SPC Seminole Campus to a packed house and beamed to the other three SPC campuses through digital means. The panel of college professors and one immigrant student from Mali (Sane Haidara), led an interesting, and thought-provoking discussion followed by questions being fielded from the four-campus audience.

Peace must begin with each person (each day) and the needs of people in

distress or neglect eventually affect all of us was one of the conclusions. Thus, as a world community, our leadership role as Americans needs to be nurtured with others so that greed and pride can be mitigated and peace and understand-

ing promulgated-the goals of both Seeds of Peace and Rotary.

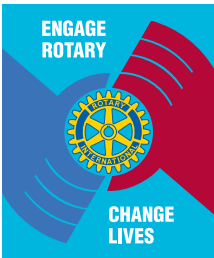

SHELTER BOX DONATIONS

The Rotary Club of Brooksville is proud to announce the recent donation of ShelterBox #2237 which will help a family in need somewhere in the world. The donation amount to sponsor each box is \$1000, which includes delivery direct to those who need it.

Every year, hundreds of thousands of families across the world lose everything when disasters strike. Through no fault of their own and often with no warning, families lose their homes, their possessions and their livelihoods. Every day they are faced with a battle for survival and it is Rotary International's mission to help them.

ShelterBox is the premier international aid organization that provides emergency shelter and life-saving equipment following disasters such as earthquake, volcano, flood, hurricane, cyclone, tsunami or conflict.

ShelterBox was founded in 2000 on a very simple principle: the right to life and dignity. The mission – provide a compact, universal tool kit to families displaced by disasters. ShelterBox affords dignity, self-sufficiency and most importantly, human survival in the immediate aftermath of a disaster.

The top priority of many aid organizations is to provide food, water and medical care to help people survive the immediate aftermath of a disaster. Without protection from the elements, survivors are at a higher risk as they await nourishment or medical attention. Rotary recognized that little or no assistance was given in terms of proper shelter to help them through the first few days, weeks and months as they tried to rebuild their lives. In response, ShelterBox developed a solution to help disaster survivors during the critical period following a disaster but preceding reconstruction.

Each box supplies a family with a tent and life-saving equipment to use while they are displaced or homeless. Contents are tailored depending on the nature and location of the disaster.

Rotaract & Interact

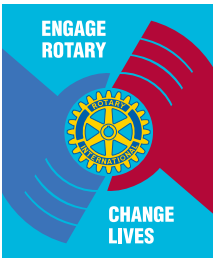

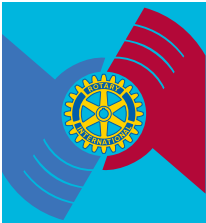
