## March is Rotary Literacy Month

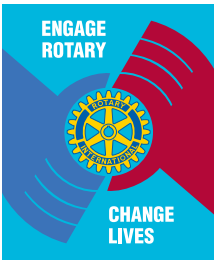

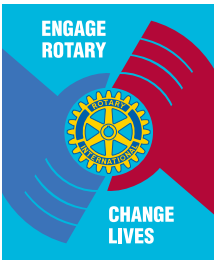
Principal Michael Bohnet introduced the February students of the month to the Rotary Club of Seminole Lake during their weekly meeting at Freedom Square on February 21 2014.

Even though our membership includes people of every race, gender and all religious and political persuasion, we find way to bridge our differences and encounters are rare in Rotary. We can and do find a way to get along in our world.

"The Rotary way works! But Rotary has no patent on it, for it is but the Golden Rule in action. Any person, any nation, can apply it by displacing negative hatred and fear with goodwill based upon understanding. Peace among nations is not impossible of attainment; they can find peace if they will." – Paul P Harris, January 1946. This month also includes the anniversary of the first meeting of Rotary held on 23 February 1905.

Our District Conference in Freeport Bahama's is a place where we can have the added benefit of International understanding through Rotary projects in a poverty stricken area. With four clubs in Freeport it will be very easy to get involve in a project. 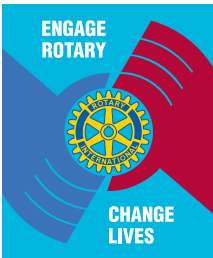
S4TL organization works to create a life changing week for our future leaders; the students that we select from the best of the best.

### World Collaboration for Peace



Chuck Oldanie, local realtor and long-time member of the Seminole Lake Rotary Club, presented his long-held vision of how three prominent charitable organizations with similar intentions: Rotary International, Seeds of Peace and Habitat for humanity, may someday work collaboratively to promote the idea of Peace through Understanding.

Rotary has an international membership of 1.3 million members and has long held the idea of Peace through Understanding by promoting group and youth study exchanges. Seeds of Peace, an international organization, brings youth from conflicted areas together to see that by understanding each other, their conflicts might be lessened or resolved. Habitat for Humanity is an international organization dedicated to having people come together in a common effort to build residences for the disadvantaged. By having all three of these organizations work together, the idea of 1+1+1=4 is not a mathematical equation but an equation of reality of the strength in numbers.

Chuck has been working on this potential collaborative effort since 2000 and recently saw the results of his efforts when he organized a Habitat build in Mumbai India which was coordinated through the local Rotary Clubs as well as Seeds of Peace.

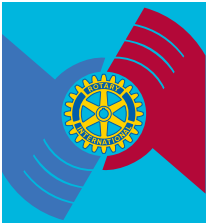
