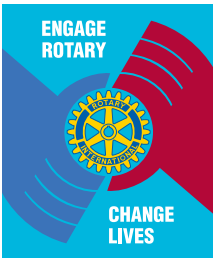

August is a busy month for Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) in our District.



Our 15 students from all 4 counties in the District are packing their bags to head to the countries they for which they have been training for 8 months to attend school in their selected country. These 15 to 18 year olds are going to 14 different countries around the world and they will learn a new language just so they can ask for a glass of water. All of these countries have different cultures that will require quite an adjustment from here at home. These are some of the bravest young people you will ever meet. But they would not be going anywhere if it were not for the 15 Rotary Clubs in our District that stepped up to be their sponsoring clubs, which is required for them to apply for the program.

They were interviewed in November 2012 along with their parents and those selected were given their country assignments in December. From that point forward they have been going through training by 1st attending a 2 1/2 day orientation with classes beginning at early in the morning and running until late evening filled with information about what it takes to be a successful exchange student. They also have to do many exercises and role playing to make sure that they can handle the rigors of being alone in a foreign country.

When asked what it takes to be an exchange student the best answer is "you do not have to be the smartest applicant (but you must have good grades), you don't have to be the best athlete (but just be willing to try your best to compete), they don't have to be the toughest kid on the block (but be willing to get back up and give it a go when they get knocked down) and they do not have to come from wealthy families because Rotary makes exchanges affordable and

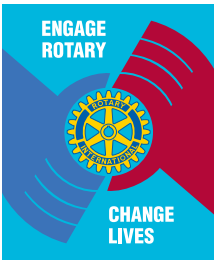
will help those that need a little financial help."

What these young people do have to exhibit is that they have "THE RIGHT STUFF" to persevere when the going gets tough and that they won't

give up and call their folks and ask to come home BEFORE they have completed their 10 month exchange.

The next application process begins in September for the class that will leave August 2014. So if you know a young person that will be 15 to 18 1/2 years old when they leave next August and you believe they have "The Right Stuff" send them to our web site www.ryeflorida.org to find out more about how to explore this once in a life time opportunity.

Rotary International getting Rid of Polio in the World



Rotary District Governor Roger Proffer addressed the Rotary Club of Seminole Lake on Friday August 23 at their regularly scheduled 7:15 AM meeting at Freedom Square. As Rotary International had set a goal, in 1985, to rid the world of polio by 2005 (the hundredth anniversary of the founding of Rotary) some stubborn cases still persist, mainly in Islamic countries. To that end Saudi Arabia has pledged \$4 Billion to see that children in these countries are properly vaccinated.

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has also pledged nearly \$1 Billion to work with Rotary and the World Health Organization to see that this scourge is eliminated. The Gates Foundation pledges have been in the form of matching grants to which Rotary has risen to the challenge as Rotary has voluntarily raised over \$1 Billion also.

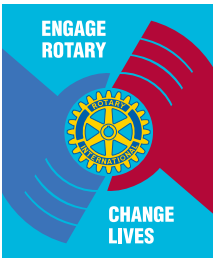

The school is located in Corporant Plateau Central and offers education programs in agriculture, building construction and woodworking. It is an initiative of Rotary's Partners in Agriculture and Partners in Health, who have brought modern health care and sustainable agriculture practices in Haiti. CFFL was created to contribute to sustainable development in Haiti with an emphasis in rural areas, characterized by a high level of poverty, unemployment and limited access to education. This has been the Rotary Club of Brooksville's international project for the past three years.

Weeki Wachee River Clean-Up

Members of the Hernando County Rotary Clubs (Rotary Club of Brooksville, Spring Hill and Spring Hill Central) and Kings Bay Rotary Club met this past Saturday once again at Weeki Wachee Springs State Park to remove the invasive Lyngbya Algae from the River.



This particular clean-up was done at the mermaid theater. It allowed the public both in the theater and outside in the swimming area to watch and learn about this community endeavor. Divers from local shops and home owners along the river went into the deep waters of the Spring and gathered the algae in bags which were brought to the surface and removed.

Lyngbya is a filamentous algae that has hair-like strands that can rise 10 to 14 feet from the floor of the Weeki Wachee River to the surface. It is slimy to the touch, is dark green to almost black in color, wraps around boat propellers and looks like raw sewage on the surface of the water. This algae is contributing to the destruction of the aquatic ecosystem in Weeki Wachee Springs. It needs to be physically removed from the waters as no chemical or algaecide can penetrate its dense

mats to kill it. Dead Lyngbya must also be physically removed as it suffocates everything it covers.

The Hernando Rotary Clubs have partnered with the Southwest Florida Water Management District in efforts to remove the Lyngbya.

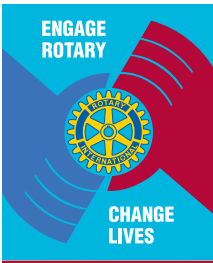

Jimmy Vines of the Seminole Historical Society (and retired educator from Seminole High) presented a very interesting description of the history of the Community from the earliest

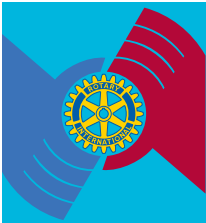
